

4th-Generation Owner Celebrating 100 Years In The Concrete Business

CROMWELL - Continuity and change are both on display as Cromwell Concrete Products Inc., located at 667 Main St., celebrates its 100th

Jason Libera, the president and owner of the business that was started by his great-grandfather in 1925, knows this best.

"Every generation in my family left their mark," Libera said of the "baton passing" from great-grandfather to grandfather to father and, ultimately, to Libera, a 52-year-old resident of Rhode Island. "But each generation changed the company, worked hard, and got it to the next level," he added. "Every generation did its part to get us where we are today.

Libera said the tale of the business started in 1925 when his great-grandparents, Joseph and Anna, immigrated from northern Italy in the 1920s with their children. Their son Nello, who was 2 years old at the time, would later make major contributions to the business as it developed over the decades.

The couple bought a 10-acre plot of land where the business still stands on Main Street in the early '20s, and they operated it as a farm with a fruit stand. Libera said that in 1925, his greatgrandfather also started making and selling concrete statues of animals, bird baths, and planters. This ornamental concrete was the beginning of their turn from farming to concrete manufactur-

As the concrete business grew, the farming

The company changed significantly when my grandfather, Nello, revolutionized it in the 1940s by turning it into a large-scale manufacturing facility," Libera said.

It was in the 1940s when Libera's grandfather Nello oversaw the construction of the "block plant" where the concrete blocks are produced and which is still used to manufacture them today. "We've upgraded machinery," Libera said. "But the original building is still there."

Libera's father Raymond took over the business in the 1980s, and Libera credits him with keeping the business "going and growing." Then Libera himself became a partner in the business

Since that time, the company began selling concrete pavers to contractors and homeowners, and it eliminated the part of the business involving pre-cast products in 2020.

What I'm most proud of is that we navigated and grew the business through an ever-changing economy over the past 18 years," Libera said.

His mother, Mary Ann Libera, said, "Cromwell Concrete has gone through many changes since it's beginning 100 years ago. Jason has been instrumental in keeping the company successful and competitive now and for the future.

In addition to contractors and homeowners, the company sells concrete block to the State of Connecticut and various municipalities. They also sell and rent tools needed for installing the pavers to both contractors and homeowners.

But he gets special satisfaction from the paver

projects. "I really enjoy helping people create an outdoor living space that they can enjoy year round," Libera said.

Libera works side by side with his wife Jodi, who serves as vice president and secretary. "It's

a family affair." Libera said. "I'm really proud of what we've done here. I have been working since I was 15. I've learned so much, and its very gratifying to be a part of a multi-generational family

Local Officals Support Local Doctor Trying To Avoid Deportation Inquiry By Liam McLoughlin

CROMWELL — Town officials have taken to social media to voice their concerns over a unnerving letter received by Dr. Lisa Anderson, a U.S. citizen and Cromwell resident.

Anderson, a preventative medicine physician with more than 20 years practicing, was born in Pennsylvania. She received an email from the Department of Homeland Security, almost two weeks ago now, that said, "It is time for you to leave the United States."

The automated Customs and Border Protection email also read, "If you do not depart the United States immediately you will be subject to potential law enforcement actions that will result in your removal from the United States — unless you have otherwise obtained a lawful basis to remain here," according to WVIT's report.

The CBP Home App was launched in March as part of the DHS's attempt to encourage the use of a "self-deportation reporting feature for aliens illegally in the country," according to the DHS Mar. 10 press release.

The release goes on to characterize this strategy as the "safest option," while also an effective method for decreasing government costs.

"The CBP Home app gives aliens the option to leave now and self-deport, so they may still have the opportunity to return legally in the future and live the American dream," DHS Secretary Kristi Noem said in the announcement. "If they don't,

we will find them, we will deport them, and they will never return."

"I really have no idea how my email ended up on that list," Anderson told WVIT. This came just a few days following a Boston resident, and U.S. citizen, Nicole Micheroni, receiving the same

"She's an American citizen who was born in Pennsylvania," Senator Matt Lesser said on social media. "Shocking and outrageous behavior, a stunning violation of the Constitution."

Traffic Accidents On The Rise On Local Stretch Of Rte. 91

ROCKY HILL - Hardly a month passes without news of another road safety incident on Interstate-91 in Rocky Hill. Last year there were several traffic deaths on the Rocky Hill stretch of I-91. And while there has yet to be a traffic death in Rocky Hill this year, crashes and incidents of dangerous driving continue with frightening regularity. And there is no end in sight.

On Sunday, April 6 at 10:21 a.m., a crash occurred on the northbound lane between Exits 23 and 24. The crash closed three lanes and snarled traffic for the rest of the morning. Fortunately, there were only minor injuries as a result of the

Last month, on March 17, a crash on the southbound side of I-91 just past Exit 23 resulted in damage to the guardrail. As it occurred during the evening rush hour, there was considerable congestion and knock-on traffic jams on neighborhood streets, as drivers exited the highway in an attempt to avoid more delays.

On March 3, a man was arrested for driving approximately 115 mph on I-91 northbound near Exit 24. The incident occurred around 12:30 p.m. when the road was teeming with midday commuters. The driver was pulled over and apprehended peacefully.

On Feb. 1, several drivers sustained injuries after their car slid off the road into a drainage culvert at around 2 a.m. Police arrived on the scene, assisted the occupants out of the embankment, whereupon they were transported to area hospitals for non-life-threatening injuries.

Just two days prior, on Jan. 30, a driver suffered life-threatening injuries after a car rolled over at Exit 23, closing the exit for a time.

It's not clear why this short, suburban stretch

of I-91 would be the sight of so many dangerous incidents. It is surely a concern for daily commuters and area residents. While the DOT has plans to erect noise barriers along stretches of I-91 in the area, there is little news about traffic safety measures or initiatives from the state. While highway noise is a concern, crashes and fatalities are much more so.

So far this year more than 50 traffic fatalities have occurred on Connecticut roads and highways. This number is down from recent years 2022 to 2024 saw historic highs in traffic deaths - yet is still a tragically high number. And while few deaths are reported in the Rocky Hill area, it is still a stretch prone to many incidents, including crashes, speeding, and reckless and danger-

These incidents occur so often that we have become desensitized to them- we consider only how they might delay our commute, and not the potential injury and loss of life. But these crashes and deaths can be avoided.

We know what works: increased police presence and enforcement of driving infractions public education campaigns that reach younger and at-risk drivers, lowering speed limits, continued and intensified anti-intoxicated-driving campaigns, increased use of ride-sharing/hailing services and more safe and reliable public trans-

portation, with real incentives for people to ride. All of these measures, when taken together reduce traffic crashes and traffic deaths. It requires only the will from state and local officials to enact them. Until that happens, we can only wait for the next tragic incident to occur on our

Superintendent Addresses Concerns Over Elementary School Roof Leak

ROCKY HILL - Earlier this month, Superintendent of Schools Dr. Mark Zito wrote to Board of Education Chairman Steve Slattery regarding an inquiry about the roof of West Hill Elemen-

Zito's letter referenced an anonymous Facebook post with pictures of water entering the school during rainy weather.

Zito's letter was then shared with parents in the April 10 Mustang Newsletter. In the letter, Zito discusses the social media

post that contained several allegations regarding the learning environment at West Hill Elementary School.

Zito mentions that the school has needed a new roof for a number of years.

"A review of documents from our approved Capital Improvement Plans (CIPs) indicates that the Board of Education first identified the need to replace the roof during the FY 2019-2020 budget development profess with a target date of FY 2022-23 for construction," Zito wrote. "As a point of fact, the aging roof is experiencing periodic leaking following major rain events.'

Zito pointed out that during the current fiscal year, five leaks occurred, requiring repairs of

Zito noted that roof leaks are addressed promptly with the district's on-call contractor to address the necessary repairs. Measurements have been implemented to prevent mold growth, which includes drying all the affected areas, conducting thorough inspections, and removing any water-soaked materials.

The most recent leak in the school occurred in late February, requiring the temporary installation of a water collection system. The source of the leak was difficult to locate and repair.

"This system remains in place as a precaution and will be removed once we are confident that the issue has been fully resolved," Zito said. There have been no recent signs of leak activity."

According to Zito, Jacunski Humes Architects has been contracted to provide roof design and construction administration services.

Design drawings are currently in process.

'The estimated total project cost is \$2,297,899, with the town's share amounting to \$1,591,719 after reimbursement from the State of Connecticut through the Department of Administrative Services Office of School Construction Grants and

In the letter, Zito assured Slattery that the school's doors remain closed and locked at all times, with the exception of school arrival and

During arrival and dismissal times, staff members monitor individuals leaving and entering the school. When classes are in session, all visitors or late-arrival students come through the main entrance, which is access-controlled and monitored at all times.

Currently, the Rocky Hill Police Department provides three full-time school resource officers (SROs). The SROs rotate their assignments throughout the school day to maintain visibility

of all the district's schools during arrival and dis-

"Our Integrated Pest Management vendor has not observed any unusual insect activity during their monthly inspections," Zito said. "Any reported concerns regarding insect activity are promptly addressed and treated by the vendor."

The nurse at West Hill School has no increased reports of asthma-related visits to the "As you know, the Board of Education antici-

pates returning approximately \$1.6 million to the Town of Rocky Hill on June 30, 2025, following the close-out on the CIGNA health insurance plan, as outlined in my March 21, 2025, memo to the Town Manager," Zito said.

In Zito's memo from March, he noted that the BOE requests that this particular funding be placed into the capital non-recurring account to be used specifically for capital improvement proj-

Zito anticipates the finalization of the design for a new roof later in the month.

Zito said the earliest projected date for the beginning of construction would be July 1, 2026.

P And Z Reviewing Plans For Large Storage Facility

ROCKY HILL — Storing holiday decorations, childhood photos, and even classic vehicles is a pain and takes up a ton of space.

But, it looks like townresidents with this issue might be getting the solution they need as Planning and Zoning officials met with lawyers representing the owner of 1610 Silas Deane Highway.

Attorney Peter Alter, of Alter, Pearson & Hope out of Glastonbury, led the discussion and introduced what the owner, Ron Lyman, hopes to do with the property.

A portion of the property in question was previously approved for a \$10 million hotel and restaurant project right before the COVID-19

However, according to a letter submitted to the PZC from Alter, "Due to the economic conditions and issues with the State of Connecticut and the Metropolitan District, the project has not yet advanced...the owner has now considered an alternative, less impactful and more economically feasible development."

Instead of a hotel, a "state-of-the-art" storage facility would be built. According to Alter, the building would resemble an office building, and include numerous interior storage spaces. He explained that the "state-of-the-art" nature of the project lies within its keypad security and lighting and temperature controls, which offer residents more peace of mind over their belongings.

What we're presenting tonight is a proposal to seek a text amendment to add self-contained, self- storage facility use within the regional commercial zone, under which this property sits," Alter said. "What has become apparent, and interesting, your regulation has no provision for any self- storage facility in town at the present time and the proliferation of multifamily apartments, like the one you just approved, causes people to need other opportunities to store their personal property. There's been a great need expressed and apartment complexes just can't provide the kind of storage that people seem to require these days." Rear portions of the site are to be included

within conservation easements to prevent further development. Also discussed were possibilities for solar panels, options for colors, and integration with the current off-ramp on I-91.

Project representatives are now expected to return, at an unknown date, with a draft text amendment. Once approved, they will begin working more closely with designers, engineers, and construction experts to get started.

Public Forum To Discuss Critical Housing Problem

ROCKY HILL - It's well known there is a housing crisis in Connecticut and Rocky Hill has not

escaped the problem. În 2001 and again in 2022, when many first-

time home buyers bought homes while interest rates were at 3.0% to 4.0%, those homeowners do not want to sell to upgrade or downsize and purchase a new home when interest rates are double what they were when they first purchased a home. The result is a low number of houses on the market. Economics 101 says a scarcity of a product will result in an increase in the price of that product. People who are willing to sell their home are getting their asking price and even above their price.

The rental housing situation in Connecticut is abysmal. Affordable rents are hard to find. Much of the housing stock in Connecticut is old - old three-family houses and two to three-story building apartments with many of those built just after World War II.

Some say zoning laws, restrictive policies and taxes in many towns are causing problems resulting in a lack of new apartment construction. It's common for renters in Connecticut to spend more than half of their income on rent when 30% To help educate potential home buyers and

Fire District Boards Rejects **Town Plan To Merge Budgets**

CROMWELL — Mayor James Demetriades is pleading for public support in a unique situation to "streamline the voting process, reduce voter fatigue, reduce duplicative referendum costs on the taxpayers and promote higher turnout" in town

Demetriades took to Facebook last week to invite support in encouraging the Cromwell Fire District to amend their bylaws and combine their budget referendum and commissioner elections. According to Demetriades' post, "the Crom-

well Fire District is a special district created by the legislature in the 1800s, which is a separate government from the town of Cromwell.. Specifically, the district was established "by

a Special Act of the Connecticut legislature on March 16, 1893, which authorized the District to "provide a sufficient water supply of water for fire and other purposes by contract with the Cromwell Water Company," according to their website.

He believes doing so would be for the betterment of the public, and provide a more efficient and convenient voting experience. Demetriades submitted a letter to the Board of Commissioners requesting a review and amendment on Feb. 13.

As shown in the Cromwell Fire District's meeting minutes documents, officials discussed this possibility at their last two Board of Fire Commissioners meetings, on March 18 and April

At their March meeting, the topic received mixed opinions. Commissioner Charles Epstein agreed that "it will increase voter turnout and awareness and be more convenient to residents to only have to vote once."

However, other commissioners, like Robert McIntyre, were opposed to the integration. "Voters who come to vote no on the Town budget will be more likely to also vote no on the District budget," he said. "While we do have separate budgets, one can influence the voting on the other...Combining our efforts with the Town could politicize the process. The focus of the board is concern for the health and safety of our residents; and to provide them with clean, safe drinking water."

The board tabled the topic until April to wait for more information, at which point they voted 5 "yes" to 2 "no" in favor of maintaining the status

In a letter responding to Demtriades dated April 16, Roger T. Hart, the executive director of the Cromwell Fire District wrote, "I sincerely appreciate the Town and District's efforts to look to the future to try and share services, but for now the issue of a Town and District combined budget and election vote seems to be a closed matter."

Mayor Demetriades subsequently launched a petition and has encouraged residents to sign

Hartford, Local Officials Developing Plans For Added Trails Along CT River

WETHERSFIELD - New Town Planner David Elder introduced a study last week that has been going on for more than a year, in partnership with the City of Hartford, the town of Wethersfield, and Riverfront Recapture.

Mark Nichols reported that Riverfront Recapture is thrilled to be working on the project and he thinks it is a great opportunity for Hartford

"This is part of our bigger vision since 1982," said Nichols. "Riverfront has had a master plan of connecting Hartford and East Hartford residents to the Connecticut River, with an expansion both north and south to Windsor, Wethersfield, Glastonbury and South Windsor," he said. Then he handed the presentation off to senior transportation planner Daniel Anstutz of the consulting firm VHB.
"This is the Hartford to Wethersfield Multi-

Modal Trail Routing Study," said Anstutz. "I want to talk a little bit about where we've gone and where we're going." He said they were looking at a trail rather than an onroad facility, but there are also some options for that through the city and

"The purpose of the study was to study and recommend a trail route connection between the Charter Oak Landing in Hartford and the Put-nam Bridge Trail in Wethersfield," he said. He said there are many bicycle and pedestrian infrastructures already on the maps and there are also trails within the area. Some of these in the city of Hartford include Locust Street, Meadow Street, Elliott Street, separated bike lanes up on Wethersfield Avenue and bike lanes that have been in place for a while on Murphy Road, Reserve Road. The city is also planning to put bicycle lanes on Wawarme Avenue.

He said they also worked on bike lanes for Wolcott Hill Road and there are trails within the area of Wethersfield Cove Trail, across the river there's also the South Meadows River Trail and work that the town is doing to connect the Putnam Bridge Trail into Old Wethersfield along Marsh Road, along the reconstruction of Main

Alignments that are being considered include Old Wethersfield, where the Putnam Bridge travels west along State Street and Hartford Avenue. Anstutz said that Marsh Street and Great Meadow Road are already being completed by the town in some way or another. And they are working on the Heritage WayTrail that is going to connect right into Main Street and then the Main Street reconstruction which is going to have a trail or path associated with that.

The Hartford onroad alignment is mostly about bike lanes with a discussion about ballards to protect the lanes and possibly widening streets.

A longer term goal for getting people to the river is called the Hartford Levee/River Alignment, which would be very expensive and time consuming, and may have to be studied for environmental impact.

The presentation included many handouts and diagrams, which were distributed to the people who came to the meeting. There is as yet no website for this study, but the intention is to finish it up within the next couple of months and to get a draft report out at that time.

Town Advisory Committee Seeks Input From Seniors

WETHERSFIELD - Significantly, there are 11,000 registered voters in the town over the age of 55. This, in a town with a total population of 27,000 people. Speaking for the Senior Citizen Advisory Committee last week, Eunice Dibella said one of the group's goals is to keep up with the needs of this august group. Problem is, they are very hard to get in touch with.

Dibella said that, in addition to the need for a safer and better-functioning senior center which the town is already working on, the committee wants to survey the senior population to find out what some of their more specific needs might be. They are in the process of developing the questions for a brief survey, but they are stumped as to how to reach the people they need to have fill

"There are obvious ways that information can be disseminated; you can leave things in the library, places of worship, Town Hall," said Dibella. But senior citizens are not attuned to digital formats, she said, and with the exception of the folks who regularly attend events at the senior center, it is going to cost money to get out the word.

"Once you collect the data, you have to collate the results and make sense out of it," she continued. "So we would like to respectfully request a modest appropriation of \$2,000, which is way less than the whole project would take, but it is to get you thinking about it," Dibella told the Town Council on April 7.

'We want you to consider the fact that seniors are a very large part of the population of this town, and they really deserve the consideration of this town to support them and to support the programming, and to try to figure out where their needs lie," Dibella said.

The Senior Citizen Advisory Committee receives a small yearly stipend with which it presents a yearly educational program in May. The subject of this year's program is personal safety, and it will be presented by the Wethersfield Police

Other objectives of the committee are to review the Town Code as it applies to the committee, and it is currently working on the final draft of recommendations to be submitted to the town.

Mayor Ken Lesser, himself a member of the Wethersfield Senior Center, added that one needs only to be 55 years old to join and that there are many benefits of that membership.

Council Decides To Use Reserves To Reduce Projected Tax Increase

- Before the final budget meeting that took place on April 22, Town Council members got together at a special meeting to discuss final changes to the proposed Operating Budget and Capital Improvement Plan.

During the meeting, town councillors made various reductions to proposed budget items and areas of the town, including funding for bridge inspections, Candlewyck Park, sidewalk and curb maintenance, highway and parks garage improvements, and others.

The majority of present councillors agreed to remove \$450,000 from the funds allocated from Candlewyck Park, as well as \$50,000 from both the highway and park garage improvement bud-

Mayor Trister explained his and his colleagues' rationale for many of these decisions, saying they looked for areas "...where we felt were a little overfunded and we could take a little off the top to get a little more cut from the budget. We looked everywhere, we looked under every stone we possibly could."

The council also made certain increases in funding in certain areas. Funding attributed to "Historic Properties" increased from \$40,000 to \$50,000, and the Economic Development Commission was also allocated an additional \$1500.

An additional \$13,000 was also given to the Newington Senior Center. This decision was made in the wake of a loss of federal funding to the organization's "Elderly Nutrition Program" and will ideally ensure everyone at the center has access to regular meals.

A major topic of the night was the decision to increase the amount of the General Fund balance by \$2,300,000, intended to be used as a "tax relief" strategy for residents amidst rising costs. This would subsequently increase the total amount used from the fund to \$5,625,000.

"I hate touching our savings account," said Councillor A.J. Tiniakos. "If you've looked at

'Yes, it's raining now, but that's not to say that it's going to be showering and thundering in the future, too," Budrejko said. She also explained that the upcoming revaluations are "going to hit us hard" next year, and having a healthier General Fund at that point could be the saving grace.

Budrejko also mentioned that this would take the Town's savings from 18.4% to 16%, which would affect their overall credit rating.

The final operating budget for the 2025-26

year, as well as the CIP budget, was expected to be finalized April 22.

Youth Council Seeks Tighter Control For Unregulated Substances By Margaret Radman

NEWINGTON - Protecting teens from the persistent and growing threat of unregulated substances that are readily accessible in corner stores, gas stations, and convenience stores was the key issue of the Newington Youth Council meeting last week. The discussion, that was led by Clinical Ser-

vices Coordinator Kayla Hendrickson, focused on the need for tighter regulation on the sale of products like Delta 8 - a synthetic cannabis substance, and kratom, a tropical southeastern botanical, that are both popular among teens.

The discussion came on the heels of the townsponsored vaping, cannabis, and kratom info session for parents in March. "We talked about the different kinds of cannabis that is being sold at the gas station," and the dangers of vaping, said

As there is currently no minimum age to purchase these unregulated, non-FDA approved products, this makes them easily accessible to teenagers who may be unaware of the potentially serious health risks associated with their use, stressed Hendrickson.

Delta 8, a synthetic cannabinoid product is, unlike products from licensed cannabis dispensaries, entirely untested, with unpredictable effects, that could contain harmful contaminants and impurities. It is associated with an array of side effects including anxiety, vomiting, dizziness, cognitive issues, and psychosis.

"One of the things we're seeing in this product is early onset psychosis because of the potency," explained Hendrickson.

Kratom, also an unregulated substance that is widely available throughout the state, is purported to have certain medicinal/recreational effects

but is associated with serious health risks including liver damage, increased heart rate, and addictive potential, as well as exacerbation of existing mental problems.

In collaboration with the community and Steps - the Southington-based coalition that is dedicated to addressing the problems of underage drinking, tobacco, vaping, cannabis use and misuse among youth - the Youth Council is making a significant impact and change in the law may be on the horizon.

Hendrickson highlighted the work of Steps that advocates around the capitol for regulation to set the minimum age to 21 for the purchase of

Currently there is pending legislation that was introduced in January of this year. If passed, kratom and similar unregulated substances will be treated the same as tobacco and alcohol in Connecticut, requiring a purchaser to be at least 21

While laws prohibiting sales will be a deterrent to teens, the continued need for raising awareness on the dangers of these substances remains. The council will be accomplishing this through fund raiser events coordinated with local restaurants as well as educational events, guest speakers, and alliances with organizations such as Alateen, Interval House, and CCAR (Conn. Community for Addiction Recovery)

Consideration is also being given to establishing a dedicated panel to address the problems of underage substance abuse.

The Youth Council will continue to host hybrid events as they have in the past, Hendrickson added, giving everyone an opportunity to join in the discussion.

and the wetlands that are flagged on this plan."

Member Alan Paskewich agreed with some of Zelek's initial concerns, adding, "Based on the 100-year storm event that this plan has been designed to, I think it's going to be a factor that's going to possibly cause flooding. I can't predict the future, but the future is moving fast due to climate change across the country...Flooding moving down to Kitts Lane, there's no buffer to stop it. Trees are going to be taken down, deforested, and it's going to be a flood."

Other commissioners emphasized the work the applicant has done to address concerns, and mitigate any potential damage to the site and surrounding areas. In a town memorandum, town engineer Chris Zibbideo, outlined these changes, which included a reduction to 40 units, modification to the drainage system, elimination of a looped road, and revisions to landscape plans to minimize "potential erosion."

'In general, the applicant did a ton of work to prevent disruption to the wetland and I really appreciate that," member Gregory Ostrinsky said.
"I trust that the applicant will do what they can to prevent destruction to the wetland."

The nature of this approval might well have had a different outcome if single family homes, or some other type of structure were being built, according to member John Bachand.

"I think the saving grace here is that this is going to be a private owner, so if something goes wrong — if it's causing flooding or if it's damaging their own property, that's on them...they are going to have to carry that responsibility," he said.

3-Vehicle Crash Claims 4 Lives, **Investigation Is Continuing**

NEWINGTON -- The Newington Police Department is investigating a fatal motor vehicle crash that took place over the weekend.

The accident happened on Saturday, April 19, on Willard Avenue at approximately 9 a.m. Police said the cause of the crash is still underdetermined.

According to police, three vehicles were involved in the crash, and four people were pronounced dead.

Police identified the four victims as 17-year-old Gabriela Difo, of Newington; 50-year-old Florinda Tineo, of Newington; 48-year-old Jeannette Tineo, of Newington; and 56-year-old Maritza Smith, of

A fifth person who was involved in the crash suffered minor injuries.

Police said physical evidence at the scene paints a fundamental picture of the events leading up to

"It does not appear as though the surviving victim of the crash was at fault," Police said. "We can also confirm that the vehicles involved were not stolen or driven by anyone without the owner's

Investigation into the case will take several weeks or months to complete.

The reconstruction process for the investigation involves numerous investigative steps, including collecting digital information from each vehicle, canvassing for any residential or business video, interviewing witnesses, completing vehicle inspections, conducting damage analysis, and more.

Dog parents can practice pet etiquette

Dogs are popular pets. Forbes Advisor reports 65.1 million households in the United States have a dog, and there are roughly 89 million dogs in the country. According to Dogster, Canadians own about 7.9 million dogs as of 2022.

People have grown accustomed to treating their dogs like members of the family, and that means that dogs increasingly are being brought along on errands, traveling with their human companions, and even being brought into the workplace. It's important for pet parents to always be mindful of their dogs' behavior when out and about, or even hanging closer to home. Dog owners can follow these dog etiquette pointers to be responsible pet own-

Get permission from your employer before taking a dog to work. If you plan to take your pet into the workplace, whether during Take Your Dog to Work Day or Take Your Pet to Work Week, or any time of the year, it is best to check with management to find out if this is allowed. You must be

fears or allergies and be respectful of others no matter how much fun it might be to bring your dog into a public space. The warm and fuzzy feelings dog owners feel for their dogs are not necessarily shared by everyone.

- · Quiet nuisance barking. Do not leave your dog outside unattended for a long time. This can cause what the American Kennel Club characterizes as boredom barking. Quiet your dog if he or she is barking, or bring the pet indoors.
- · Always leash your dog. Some people are not comfortable around dogs. And even if your dog is friendly, others met on walks or outings may not be. To prevent uncomfortable situations or even dog bites, it's best to always leash your dog. Choose a leash short enough to prevent your dog from jumping on passersby.
- Check to see if your dog is allowed to greet people or other dogs. If someone says, "no," respect that an-

the ready so you can clean up after your dog. This also applies indoors, should your dog have an accident inside a pet-friendly store.

· Be mindful of shopping with pets. Many stores do not allow dogs inside, but employees may be hesitant to approach pet owners about such policies. Many stores only allow trained service dogs that are Americans With Disabilities Act-compliant. Service animals are defined as dogs that are individually trained to work or perform tasks for people with disabilities. Service animal designations are exclusive to dogs. However, a number of people have "emotional support animals," which are not recognized as service animals. As a general rule of thumb, know a store's policy on non-service animal

pets before visiting. And, when shopping at food stores, it's best to leave the dog at home.

· Train your dog. A dog that knows basic obedience training will behave better in the community. If you are having trouble training your dog alone, consider working with an experienced dog trainer.


