Superintendent Updates School Board on Fall Opening

While school reopening will be a little less daunting this fall, educators are still awaiting word on what kind of COVID safety measures they'll have to implement as districts return to full in-person attendance.

Cromwell Public Schools (CPS) Superintendent Dr. Enza Macri told her Board of Education (BOE) that she expects that to be an extended discussion throughout the summer.

"We're being told a lot of it will be predicated on whether the vaccination rate will go up," Macri said at the BOE's June 8 regular meeting.

Connecticut, which in May became the first state to fully vaccinate 50 percent of adults, currently boasts a 59 percent immunization rate.

The Pfizer vaccine became available for youth ages 12 to 17 in May, with Moderna's application FDA approval announced last week. State officials hope to see doses for Connecticut's youngest residents get the goahead by sometime in August.

"The higher we get with vaccination rates in the 12+ groups, the better chance we'll have at being able to come back with

no masks," Macri said. "But will we have to quarantine? Socially distance? There are no answers to any of that right now."

The district has until October to submit a report to the U.S. Treasury Department delineating how it's using the \$1.3 million allocated to it under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).

School districts can utilize the funding for a myriad of COVID relief measures including sanitation and PPE. CPS has already earmarked a portion of that fund for academic intervention and social emotional learning (SEL) support – such as the Summer Learning Institute for those that fell behind this past year.

"We've done a great job in Cromwell. We've stayed strong," Macri said. 'We know it's been a pain in the neck, but it's been a huge reason why our kids got to do as much as they got to do before the end of the year."

But BOE member Kathryn Russ says she senses some fatigue – she asked whether the district knows if those that have been vaccinated will be exempt from certain protocols, such as mask-wearing, if it makes a return.

Governor Lamont has already lifted mask requirements – in all settings – for

vaccinated individuals, but school environments have adhered to a stricter set of rules.

"This entire year, the schools have been held to a higher standard than the rest of the public and our students have bore the brunt of it," Russ said. "I strongly disagree with making vaccinated children wear masks."

Macri said she had a conference call with other area superintendents earlier that day – and that participants voiced the same concern.

"We wanted our kids to have as normal of a year end as possible, but there should be a differentiation, and legally, what does that look like?" she said. "That was a heated debate, and I think it will continue."

Another question is quarantine procedures – while it makes sense to allow those that have been vaccinated an opt-out, it will be impossible to differentiate, since staff and students are not required to notify the district if they've been immunized, Macri said.

"As of now, not allowed to ask students or staff if they've been vaccinated, but if they are about to go into quarantine, they can get out by showing their vaccination card," she said.

Town of Cromwell: June is Dog Licensing Month

Every dog, except dogs under a kennel license as provided in C.G.S. 22-342, must be licensed when it becomes six months old, and then annually in June.

A valid rabies certificate must be presented if it is not up to date in the system. Dog licenses are \$8 for neutered or spayed, \$19 for non-altered dogs. All dog licenses after the month of June will be charged a \$1 late fee per month. Dog licenses are issued by the Town Clerk's office, Town Hall, 41 West Street, Cromwell, or through the mail by providing a copy of the valid rabies certificate, a check payable to Cromwell Town Clerk, and a self-addressed stamped envelope.

Schools Partner with Organization for Summer Learning Program

A veteran-run team building program is partnering with Cromwell Public Schools (CPS) for its Summer Learning Institute – an academic support program for kids that fell behind during the pandemic.

Joe DeRing is a special forces Army veteran who served in Iraq. Now he gives motivational speeches at Connecticut high schools, while running Empower Leadership Sports and Adventure Center in Middletown. The Center features ziplining, obstacle courses, and other activities for kids.

CPS Superintendent Dr. Enza Macri says the district's collaboration with DeRing is just one component of the summer Learning Institute – a six-week program for students in Grades 6-12.

"We had many who struggled with remote and hybrid

learning, and just the pandemic like the rest of us did," Macri told the Board of Education (BOE) at its June regular meeting. "Our goal is to catch them up academically, but there's a huge social emotional component."

The free summer school program runs on a half day, Monday through Thursday schedule from June 21 to July 29, courtesy of the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) – Cromwell Schools received \$1.3 million in total federal relief through the legislation.

Dr. Keri MacLean. "We think it will be a great experience for our students, with help and support that's needed after the year they've had."

"We're really excited," said CPS Curriculum Director

At the time of MacLeans update to the Board, 8/ students had signed up for the program – 50 at Cromwell Middle School and 37 at Cromwell High.

She said the district was waiting on 22 undecided CHS dents.

"We have a pretty strict attendance policy because they're getting credit, so it's making sure they can commit," MacLean said.

The program will focus on academic support, improving executive function, and developing organizational skills, she said.

"It's also about creating a community for those kids, es-

pecially in the transition years for kids going from 5 to 6 grade and those from 8th to 9th," MacLean said.

That's where Center comes in – DeRing and his team

will be leading team-building activities both in-district, and onsite at their Middletown headquarters.

The district will provide bus transportation to the Center

Council Seeks to Form Charter Review Commission

The Town Council is looking to form a Charter Review Commission, but just when to start the process is still subject to some deliberation.

The Council, which kicked the topic around at its May 11 and May 25 meetings, is expected to resume discussions sometime

By State Statute, Commissions can hold anywhere between 5 and 15 members elected officials may make up a maximum of one-third of those appointed. Commission representation by any single political party is limited to "a bare majority".

The Council is treading carefully on the timing because once they vote to "initiate" the review, they have 30 days to actually form the Commission itself, according to Town Clerk James Krupienski. And, if the Commission solicits public input before going to work - as is standard practice - a summer hearing will be less than ideal, Councilors said.

"I think we should wait for the fall, when people aren't on vacation and people are paying attention," said Councilor Carol Anest. "I think we need to give them an opportunity to chime in."

Town residents will have at least two, as mandated by State statute, Krupienski said.

"There's typically one at the committee's first meeting, and the second one would be them presenting their proposals to the electorate, prior to sending report to Council," he said. "That's not to say they couldn't have two or three other public hearings throughout. Two is minimal."

Newington last revised its Charter back in 2012. While some municipalities require themselves - by Charter - to reexamine it after a certain number of years, Newington's master document contains no such require-

State statute gives a commission a maximum of 16 months to issue a report of recommended changes - to be either be rejected or moved to a town wide referendum by the Council that appointed them.

"It doesn't have to be 16 months. It can take 9 or 10," Krupienski told the Council.

And then the Council has a choice: to either place the question on a November election ballot, or at some other point within the year - as early as three weeks after the Commission's presentation.

As for the ballot contents, the Council can either present the revised Charter as a single referendum item or break the proposed changes out into separate questions.

"The history has always been, they put forward a complete charter," Krupienski said. "The downside is, if you like 99 percent and the 1 percent is what people come out for, your charter fails, whereas if you place

different questions, you can have the pieces they like approved and the pieces they don't like not approved, and still make changes to your charter."

he could see the potential value in taking the latter approach - he suggested examining how other towns do their charter referendums.

Majority Leader Tim Manke said that



The bills are dated July 1st, and taxpayers do have the entire month of July to pay. The last day to pay without penalty is August 2nd. On August 3nd interest will be charged according to CT State Statute Sec. 12-146. Also, any payments must be applied to the oldest tax first according to CT State Statute Sec. 12-144b.

Do not pay online if a Motor Vehicle release is needed. Call Revenue Office for more information 860 665-8540. If you received a tax bill for a vehicle you no longer own and have questions, contact the Assessor's office at assessor@ newingtonct.gov or 860 665-8530.

Parking is available in the new parking lot near the Community Center. The Town Hall entrance is at the far end. Office hours are Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. There are no evening or weekend hours.

Payments may be made by check, money order or cash. Make checks payable to Newington Revenue Collector. One check may be made out for multiple tax bills. Postdated checks will not be accepted. Credit/debit card payments can only be made online www.newingtonct.gov/tax, and cannot be accepted in the Tax Office or by telephone. Online electronic check payments are also accepted. A tax payment drop box is located in the Police Dept. parking lot.

When paying at the Tax Office, bring the entire tax bill to have a paid receipt. If you are mailing your payment, include your entire bill with a self-addressed stamped envelope to receive a receipt.

Note: Taxpayers are responsible to make sure their taxes are paid when due. Failure to receive a tax bill does not invalidate the tax, interest or fees.

Connecticut Passes Legislation to Legalize Cannabis

Legislation legalizing and regulating recreational cannabis use for adults cleared the State House and Senate – after over 10 hours of special session deliberations between the two chambers.

Governor Lamont signed Senate Bill 1201 Tuesday morning.

The Bill:

•Allows adults ages 21 and over to carry up to 1.5 ounces of marijuana

•Allows adults ages 21 and over to store
– in a locked container – up to 5 ounces of

 Erases past marijuana criminal convictions – some automatically, and some by petition

•Sets a sales tax rate by the ounce

•Creates a pathway for distribution licensing – while establishing a Social Equity Council to prioritize communities hit hardest by drug enforcement policies

•Sets aside 50 percent of licenses for those in highly impacted communities (at 50 percent of licensing fees)

 Modifies driving and boating under the influence laws to include marijuana enforcement

•Mandates that municipalities, upon petition by at least 10 percent of their resident population, hold a referendum on whether to allow recreational cannabis sales

•Expands state's ban on public smoking and vaping to include products containing cannabis and hemp

"We've moved into the realm of Groundhog Day with this bill," said Senate President Pro Tempore Martin Looney, a Democrat who has been advocating for marijuana legalization for 7 years. "Cannabis has been available for so long. It's already here. That's a reality people didn't face during prohibition. People still drank and the money went to expand organized crime."

For lawmakers, Groundhog Day was the third debate on the legislation – prompted by a House amendment removing those with marijuana-related convictions from those given preference for distribution licensing.

So last Wednesday – 50 years after former President Richard Nixon declared the War on Drugs – New Haven Senator and Judiciary Committee Co-Chair Gary Winfield led one last debate on the sprawling legislation, before it passed the Senate on a 16-11 party line vote.

Democrats have hailed the legislation as a long overdue walk-back of War on Drug policies that have disproportionately impacted communities of color. Republicans described the Bill as rushed, accusing their Democratic colleagues of rolling the dice on public health impacts in exchange for projected revenue.

"I don't know about you, but 7 years is not a rush," Winfield told Republicans. "We have operated for 50 years with unjust laws that targeted certain communities. We've damaged the lives of certain individuals of a certain hue because of politics. We don't have the science [on cannabis] because of politics."

President Nixon made his War on Drugs declaration in June of 1971, ramping up enforcement, creating mandatory minimum sentencing, and, against recommendations from his own commission, refusing to remove marijuana from the federal government's list of Schedule One drugs – a decision that created additional hurdles for mar-

ijuana research, which currently requires DEA approval.

In 2020, the ACLU found that black individuals, relative to their white peers, were more than 3 times more likely to be arrested for marijuana possession – despite usage rates between the two groups being similar.

As states like Connecticut reckon with the long-term impacts of mass incarceration – particularly on urban communities of color – a hard look at drug policy is imperative, Democratic lawmakers said.

"Equity drives his legislation," wrote Democratic State Rep Gary Turco on social media, after the legislation cleared the House. "The bill aims to right the wrong of our past and help those most disproportionately harmed by the War on Drugs."

But the potential harm of increased recreational cannabis use, Republicans warned, is still unmeasured – and the Connecticut State Medical Society, along with medical associations in 7 other states, has echoed the concern.

"These are medical professionals telling us to study this issue," said Senate GOP Leader Kevin Kelly. "Take the time to do this right."

The State Medical Society says that while the racial justice component is critical, lawmakers can pursue equity measures without rushing the cannabis legalization piece.

"One of our chief concerns is the lack of sufficient research and clinical study upon which legislators and voters are approaching this issue," Connecticut State Medical Society President Dr. Claudia Gruss in a prepared statement. "A major contributing factor is that marijuana continues to have a Schedule I classification by the federal government, which significantly limits the comprehensive research that can be performed to inform physician and consumer decisionmaking."

Senator Matt Lesser, a 9th District Democrat who voted for the legislation, doesn't disagree with the Medical Society's sentiments regarding the unknowns – but he says criminalization hasn't been the deterrent policymakers were perhaps hoping for.

"Marijuana criminalization has been a failed experiment that has caused all sorts of other problems," Lesser wrote in a Facebook thread with constituents following the Senate's vote. "Marijuana, while illegal, is widely available today and widely consumed - but as a result of criminalization, is completely unregulated. And the criminal justice impact falls disproportionately on some communities rather than on everybody. We should shift gears to have a different conversation, one centering public health and responsible use rather than trying and failing to ban it."

But during debates, GOP Senator Dan Champagne was skeptical as to how regulated the market would truly be under the legislation.

"This bill is a drug dealer's dream. It allows you to carry marijuana and cash in ways that as long as you don't exceed a certain amount, you can go back and keep replenishing," Champagne said. "The black market will undercut the taxes, so that won't go away. These are people making money dealing drugs, and originally we were talking about giving them preference on these licenses."



Council Votes for Dismissal of Police Chief

The Town Council has voted to dismiss Police Chief James Cetran – about 6 months after his return from paid administrative leave and less than 3 months before his anticipated retirement date.

Town Manager Gary Evans said it was the latter piece that prompted his dismissal recommendation to the Council – which heard arguments from both Cetran's and Evans' legal counsel over the course of a -5-hour hearing last Monday night, before emerging from closed door deliberations to part ways with the Chief on a 6-1 vote.

Evans and labor attorney Ken Plumb say that Cetran was allowed to return January 18 under the condition that he set – and abide by – a retirement date. The January 13 retirement agreement, town attorneys say, left latitude for Cetran to vacate his post before or, if mutually agreed upon, after the deadline

So Cetran, a 47-year Department veteran, marked August 31 for his departure, making the announcement in a

Evans and the Council, meanwhile, had already initiated the search for his replacement – hiring the executive search firm Strategic Government Resources (SGR) to facilitate the process. They even held an SGR-led public forum on May 18.

But on May 14, Evans received an email from Cetran he was walking back his plans to retire. Indefinitely.

"I was shocked. Frustrated. We reached a mutual agreement," Evans said during sworn testimony given during the hearing. "It's created a lot of confusion - if I was an individual applying for this job, I'm not sure if I'd continue with the application."

The Town paid \$8,500 to cover the negotiating fees of Raymond Hassett, Cetran's attorney at the time.

"It was real taxpayer money paid for the Chief, and frankly we didn't get the terms of that deal," Plumb told the Council. "The Chief had no rights to just unilaterally decide not to comply with those terms."

Sitting beside Cetran throughout the hearing was Attorney Rachel Baird of Goldstein Law Partners. She argued that the Chief couldn't have run afoul of his terms with the Town, because Evans had already violated the agreement by, according to Cetran's allegations, micromanaging the Department on the handling of disciplinary matters.

The hearing itself, Baird contended, violated the agreement because the language directs the parties to settle any dispute regarding the terms in court.

"Why does he have to leave? Is it because he's old? I don't understand," Baird said. "Why do we have to have a retirement date for Chief Cetran?"

Cetran: discord began long before administrative leave

Cetran was placed on administrative leave last November after Evans, according to the Hartford Courant, accused him of interfering with an internal investigation regarding time reporting discrepancies for Sergeants Oscar Rivera and Jennie Rivera

By his account, it's not the first time he's clashed with he Town Manager.

In very few words, Evans confirmed that much.

"We've had our ups and downs," Evans said during Plumb's cross examination.

Evans took over at Town Hall in 2018. Cetran said that they got along well at first, but that "things changed" on August 6 of 2019 – that was when he says he received a letter from the Town Manager citing a litany of perceived performance issues

"[It was] a draft letter of like eight different things I had supposedly done wrong. Several of [them] were from before he even came here," Cetran said. "He's getting information obviously, and a lot of it is inaccurate. "I took that draft letter as a threat."

as a threat.
On April 20 that year, 18-year-old town resident Anthony Vega Cruz was gunned down by a Wethersfield officer

in a traffic stop gone wrong. The incident sparked a wave of local protests that drew police reform activists from Hartford and around the state.

Cetran said that at the time, Evans prohibited him from engaging with protestors.

"Once he told me not to, I didn't," Cetran says.

Then came the evening a hundred or so activists marched to the home of then-Mayor Amy Morrin Bello – now Wethersfield's 28th District House Rep – to demand a town-level investigation into Cruz's killing. At the time, the community was still awaiting Hardy's ruling, which came a year later.

WPD had officers stand between the protestors and Bello's property. In the Facebook video from that night, Cetran is seen stationed on the former Mayor's front porch – a move the Chief said he was admonished for in the August 6 letter.

"I said, 'if my officers are going to be in harm's way, I was going to be," Cetran said.

Cetran and his attorneys also claim that the Chief and Town Manager clashed over the Department's body camera roll out – a piece Baird says would have helped paint a quicker and clearer picture of what had transpired when former WPD Officer Layou Eulizier Jr. opened fire at Cruz's windshield as the teen's vehicle drove toward him.

Cetran described feeling as though he was being nudged toward the door.

Evans denied having any "direct" conversations with Cetran about his future employment with the town – at least before late last November, when the two sides reportedly began a 7-week retirement negotiation process.

Whatever Evans' intentions were before then, witnesses said last Monday night that he didn't want it to end like this.

In her testimony, Jenny Rivera described a conversation with Evans – post-Cetran retirement recission letter – in which the Town Manager allegedly lamented the situation.

"[He said] what was he thinking with regard to rescinding his resignation? Why would he do that?" Rivera says Evans told her at Town Hall, as she waited to meet with consultants from SGR. "[He was saying how] it's forcing him to now take other steps to do things he didn't want to do to him because of his 47 years with the town, which he did respect."

Cetran said that it was Evans' decision to 'go around him' on a recent disciplinary issue – allegedly a common point of contention between the two – that ultimately forced his hand.

By Cetran's account, he had recommended the suspension of a firearms instructor for gestures that could constitute sexual harassment – Evans, according to Cetran, wanted to have the offending party instead undergo training through "verbal counseling", before later reversing course and aligning with the Chief's recommendation.

Meanwhile, an open lieutenant slot – which Cetran and his attorneys claim he was promised full authority to fill, under agreement language delineating his responsibility over labor, disciplinary, and department management issues – remained vacant.

Cetran says Evans cited a lack of HR personnel to conduct an adequate search process.

"I just threw my hands up. What good was the agreement if he wouldn't let me run my department?" Cetran said. "I can't hold anyone accountable for their actions because everyone thinks they can just go around me."

Baird full court presses for a paper trail

Of course, the details surrounding Cetran's claims are more than a bit murky, and on Monday night Baird acknowledged that much.

"I can give you a lot of examples, but I need documents to prove it," she told the Council.

So, she launched a litany of document requests that included:

- Cetran's personnel files
- Evans' correspondences with Gonzalez
- Evans' correspondences with former WPD Lieutenant and former Acting Chief Donald Crabtree
 - Evans' correspondences with CGR
- Evans' correspondences with Cetran regarding the body camera rollout
- Town work-from-home policies amid the COVID pandemic

She implied that the documents are pieces of a coordinated campaign to undermine Cetran through his subordinates.

Each one of her requests were denied – on the basis of scope, given that the Council's deliberations were on whether the Council had just cause for dismissal, based on the recission of Cetran's retirement plans, stated Town Attorney

en Slater of Halloran & Sage.

"I'm sure the Chief has an exemplary record, but I don't think that has any bearing on the chief's intent to retire," said Mayor Michael Rell.

"To know whether he breached his agreement, you have to know why," Baird said. "How can the Town Council have possibly denied Chief Cetran his personnel records? That is beyond a denial of due process."

Baird's attempts to inquire about the aforementioned

vera were each called to the stand – were met with the same objection, leaving the two sides to argue on the obligations spelled out under the retirement agreement.

"No interference from the Town Manager," Cetran said.

"No interference from the Town Manager," Cetran said. "That's what I was told by my attorney, that that's what that agreement involved."

Plumb disputed claims regarding any management autonomy obligation. The contents of the contested Paragraph Two, he said, are simply a declaration of Cetran's responsibilities as Chief – not a directive for Evans or the Town.

"Where is the Town Manager's name in that agreement?" Plumb asked Cetran during cross examination.

"It doesn't say his name, but who else are we talking about?" Cetran said.

"The Town Manager is the director of public safety – are you saying your boss can't tell you what to do?" Plumb pressed.

"If I do something wrong, I have no problem," Cetran responded. "When he jumps the chain and talks to officers behind his back, that's when we have a problem."

In closing statements, Cetran cites 'unfinished business'

During the home stretch of cross examination, Baird asked Cetran what he hoped to accomplish, if he were allowed to remain in his post a bit longer.

Plumb objected on relevance grounds.

Rell hesitated, for just a moment.

And then Cetran chimed in.

"Overruled," he said. "I have a number of things I want to accomplish. I want to get the department back to where they're a cohesive group. I want to do the street cameras. The lieutenant promotion. Just let me do my job and I'll ride off into the sunset."

That was left to the Council, which went into a closed-door dual caucus to begin deliberations just after midnight.

They reemerged at around 1 a.m. to cast the deciding vote in favor of Cetran's dismissal.

Councilor Kevin Hill was absent, and Councilor Pat Pentalow recused himself, citing personal ties to Cetran and the Wethersfield Police Department (WPD) – Pentalow's father is a retired Wethersfield officer.

Councilor Dan O'Connor was the lone dissenter. The meeting adjourned just after 1:20 a.m.

The Wethersfield Town Council has approved a \$109 million budget that dips the Mill Rate – just slightly – for the second year in a row.

The combined town government and school board appropriation leaves the Mill Rate at 40.67 – a 0.02 of a mill drop over last year.

To get there, Council Republicans cut around \$2.3 million from the budget proposed by Town Manager Gary Evans back in March, but after American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) money is factored in, the actual reductions come to \$316,000 on the town side and \$73,000 for the Board of Education (BOE).

The federal funding will covering the town's share of COVID expense reimbursement to the Central Connecticut Health District (CCHD), portable classroom renovations at Charles Wright, \$157,000 in Parks and Recreation wages, and \$123,000 for dial-a-ride programs.

The BOE is covering \$805,000 medical self-insurance costs with unspent funds from the current year, with actuarial adjustments to pension and Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB) driving another \$100,000 in savings.

Another \$150,000 in Board health insurance costs came off, due to the Town and school district carrier switch.

Over \$773,000 in additional state aid revenue – mainly in Education Cost Sharing (ECS) and Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) reimbursement – provided additional buffering, according to Mayor Michael Rell.

"That helped us craft the finer points of our budget. This budget, like the state budget, does not increase taxes," Rell said last Monday night before the start of final deliberations. "I'm hoping we'll get, like the state budget, bipartisan support."

Democratic Councilor Matt Forrest expressed that he did too, but he also voiced concerns – Forrest spent the better portion of the two-hour meeting grilling Republicans on capital projects, public safety, and economic development-related appropriations.

Then he made his counterproposal – a 1 percent budget increase to enable the town

- Establish youth explorer programs to boost police and fire recruitment
 - Replace trees around town
 - Revitalize various sports fields
- Enhance existing efforts to keep Cove Park trash-free
- Invest further in the town's road maintenance fund

"There's like 80 percent we agree on," Forrest said. "[But] we can't be afraid to lead. The small increase in taxes would do a tremendous amount to change this town for the better."

But with many Wethersfield residents still recovering financially from the pandemic, no increase is small enough, Republicans contended.

"I'd love to do all those things, but the reality is we don't have the money," said GOP Councilor Dan 'Connor. "I wish we did, but we don't, and to think about increasing costs now turns a tone-deaf ear. I didn't get any comments saying, 'love the Town Manager's budget, do you think we can increase it a

little more?"

Evans' recommendation to the Council – a 3.1 percent spending increase over last year's budget – was driven by the costs of returning Town Hall operations to normalcy following a year of building closures and hybrid work arrangements.

While the return of part time Parks and Recreation staff – and the associated costs – was one escalation factor, the bulk of the budget, as is usually the case, was fixed by contractually-set salary and benefit hikes.

Town officials were also waiting on

guidance as to how they could utilize the ARPA funds, while assuming flat state aid revenue, based on Governor Lamont's initial state budget recommendation.

At the time Evans was also steering

At the time Evans was also steering clear of the Town's reserves – which the Council leveraged last year to avert a tax increase – but the final budget directs \$1.5 million from the fund balance.

The double-edged sword in Monday's discussions was the ARPA funds - \$7 million, between town government and BOE.

Republicans argued that the influx of two-year federal relief makes raising taxes unthinkable. Democrats contend that it presents an opportunity to make smart investments while combining it with the grant money to minimize the cost to town residents.

The sports fields and environmental initiatives present a quality-of-life proposition – among many considerations when one assesses a community's economic viability – Democrats argued.

"In order to get something positive in our town, we're going to need to invest in those things," said Democratic Councilor Ryan Biggs. "If we don't have money coming into Wethersfield, how are we ever going to keep these budgets low?"

And perhaps the biggest investment in that regard would be the \$70,000 Forrest proposed for the full-time economic development director. While current Town Planner Peter Gillispie wears that title, it's one of many duties shouldered by his office.

"Our residential [tax base] is gigantic

why we find our Mill Rate so high. It's imperative that we get our commercial state to a place where we can balance that," Forrest said. "I'm envisioning a Wethersfield that doesn't just dip their toes in the water on economic development – we need a full-time [economic development director]."

GOP Deputy Mayor Tom Mazzarella didn't disagree, but he says he took his direction from the town's Economic Development Commission (EDIC), which recommended starting out with the part time role Republicans budgeted.

"I thought there was plenty of work for a full-time position, but we went by what we were given by the Committee," he said.

The final budget passed on a 6-2 party line vote with Democratic Councilor Kevin Hill absent.

Two Forrest motions – for the Townside line items and a last-ditch proposal to increase the school budget by \$60,000 to pad against unexpected special education outplacement costs – failed by the same margin.

"If we really want to grow the Grand List, we have to show businesses we're being as fiscally responsible as possible," said GOP Councilor Tyler Flanigan. "I agree that we want to lead, but reducing the Mill Rate is not status quo."














Protect Pets in Hot Weather

Warm weather brings many changes. Warm weather can make travel more enjoyable and affords people more time to comfortably enjoy the great outdoors.

It's best to keep safety in mind when soaking up

the sun. That's important for all members of the family, including pets. Cats and dogs are as susceptible to heatrelated illnesses as their human companions.

Recognize heat stroke

Pets can suffer from heat stroke, according to the American Red Cross. Certain breeds of dogs are highly susceptible, particularly those with short snouts, such as pugs and bulldogs. Excessive exercise in hot weather, lack of appropriate shelter outdoors and leaving a dog in a hot car may precipitate an episode of heat stroke. It's important to get the pet out of direct heat right away and check for signs of shock, which include seizures, a body temperature of 104 F or higher, stupor, increased heart rate, or excessive panting. Placing water-soaked towels on the pet's feet, head, neck, and abdomen can bring down its temperature.

Be cautious of hot surfaces

Humans wear shoes on their feet for protection, but pets do not have that luxury. Think about how hot your feet can feel when you scurry barefoot across hot sand en route to the shoreline or to cross a deck to get to the pool. When the sun beats down on surfaces, those

surface temperatures rise quickly. According to a 2010 study by Liberty Home and Pet Services, at peak afternoon sun and an ambient temperature of 95 F in southern Florida, the temperature of cement was measured at 125 F, red brick at 135 F, blacktop at 140 F, and grass at 102 F. Individuals who think a car is safer for their dog or cat may be surprised the informal study measured 152 F on seat surfaces.

Provide extra water

It's likely you will need to fill your pets' water bowls more frequently in warm weather than during other times of the year. Be sure to provide constant access to fresh water, éven for young puppies who may be learning to house train.

Avoid cutting fur too short

If a veterinarian suggests a hair cut may be beneficial for keeping a pet cool or comfortable, resist the urge to shave down to the skin. Having at least one inch of fur will protect the pet from sunburn.

Outdoor hazards

Warm weather may bring out a high number of insects and wildlife. Use a flea and tick preventative product and medication to protect against heartworm, which

is transmitted through mosquitoes. Snakes, skunks, raccoons, foxes, and other animals may be roaming around, and a scuffle with your pet can result in injury.

Pets need extra care during the warm weather to avoid damage and sickness from the sun, heat and more.






