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


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
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Rocky Hill Issues Indoor Mask Mandate in Public Places

Rocky Hill has issued its own indoor mask mandate for all public places – a move Mayor Lisa Marotta says was prompted by surging COVID case rates driven by the Delta variant.

The mandate - an exercise of latitude granted to local communities by the Governor's Office - went into effect August 20 at midnight. It will apply to all individuals, regardless of vaccination status - with some exemptions.

'We're going to use that authority, based on the information available to us, to keep our community safe," Mayor Marotta said in a video statement posted Friday night to her Facebook page. "The Delta variant is here. It's highly contagious, and as long as the experts are telling us this is keeping us safe, let's do what works."

On August 5, Governor Lamont renewed his mask-on mandate for all indoor school settings, but left it to municipalities to set COVID mitigation measures for other public places.

At last Monday's Town Council meeting, Central Connecticut Health District (CCHD) Director Charles Brown told officials that he had urged the Governor's legal team to consider a statewide mask mandate - to no avail.

"Not having a mask mandate statewide,

to me, is foolish. It leaves us with a patchwork quilt that has gaps in it," he said. "I don't think it's a popular political position right now."

So he turned to local officials, urging them to take it up on their own.

Marotta was hesitant at the time, expressing the same concerns regarding uni-

"I go back and forth with it, but I really don't see, with the Governor leaving it up to the municipalities, [the point of] Rocky Hill saying 'everyone wear their masks', if Cromwell isn't going to do it, or even New Haven and Stamford," Marotta said Monday night.

But by that Friday, she was announcing Rocky Hill's mandate - detailed in a notice posted by Town Manager John Mehr's Office.

Exceptions to the rule include:

-Those that are indoors but separated by a partition

-Those indoors and maintaining at least 6 feet of social distancing

-Those with certain disabilities or behavioral challenges

-Those (who are vaccinated) taking part in a performing arts event

-Those under the age of 2

-Those indoors and alone

Marotta's Facebook address - which drew 45 comments in the accompanying thread - was met with a mix of praise and frustration from town residents.

"I don't think of this as a step backwards. We are moving forward with the tools we have in our toolbox to ensure we can keep doing what we like to do," the Mayor said. "We have a new school year starting,

our restaurants are doing great, and we want to maintain that in Rocky Hill."

As of Monday's Connecticut Department of Public Health (DPH) tracking Rocky Hill had a positivity rate of 20 per 100,000 people, placing it at the agency's red threat level.

'We will continue to monitor the situation," Marotta said. "This isn't permanent We're going to revisit it, and when the time is right, we'll make the decision to terminate the mandate."

She says that she's reached out to Governor Lamont's Office regarding a statewide

"I'm very mindful of the fact that this sort of town-by-town approach is very limited," Marotta said. "To have an effective policy, you do need to have it come from a level where there's collaboration amongst municipalities, and the only way you get that is with some kind of mandate coming from the state level."

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Cromwell Superintendent Outlines School Return Plans

A state mandate will keep masks on in schools till at least September 30 - when Governor Lamont can either renew or sunset the executive order he extended on Au-

The move, which comes on the heels of CDC recommendations that all students regardless of vaccination status - mask up indoors - has been hailed by public health experts as the best defense against the Delta variant that has driven up COVID positivity rates over the past six weeks.

'The more people that are vaccinated, the better the chance is we can ease up," said Cromwell Superintendent of Schools Dr. Enza Macri at the Board of Education's (BOE) August 10 meeting. "This variant is more contagious, but the data is, if you're vaccinated, your chances of getting severely ill are much, much, much less."

As of that night, 76 percent of Cromwell residents were vaccinated, but the younger age groups boast some of the lowest rates the state still awaits eligibility for those under the age of 12.

The mask mandate news came as districts like Cromwell were preparing their reopening plans - and awaiting the Connecticut Department of Public Health (DPH) guidelines that would shape them.

Macri's team, meanwhile, distributed a survey to district parents asking them to voice their concerns with the return to full in-person learning - Cromwell, per a sunsetting of state mandates, will not be offering any remote or hybrid option this year - and in-building COVID safety measures.

"They were all over the place," Macri said of the response comments, which by her summary, ranged from imploring school officials to make masking a choice, to those urging them to require face coverings until all students can be vaccinated.

What parents did seem to agree on, however, was getting kids back into the classroom - both to catch up academically and fulfill the social emotional piece that's been the talk of school districts across the

"Our number one priority is to keep kids in school, and we're doing the best we can," Macri said.

When and where exactly will masks be required?

The general rule is that masks must be worn inside, but with some exceptions.

One is the cafeteria – last year students were prohibited from talking during lunch periods to mitigate the risk of spread while they were eating.

This fall that will change.

"You have to weigh the risks and the benefits, so we'll give it a try," Macri said. "We want them to talk, because you have to have that social-emotional component."

The district's mitigation strategy will prohibit loud conversations, the Superintendent said.

'They have to talk quietly, because if they talk loudly, there's a good chance of spraying droplets," she said. "They'll put their masks back on when they're waiting to go outside, and when they get outside, they'll be able to take their masks off."

recommend holding as many activities outdoors as feasible.

How will social distancing be handled?

The CDC recommends a minimum of 3 feet social distancing, so that's how classrooms - per seating charts - will be arranged, Macri said.

Other areas of the school buildings such as the cafeterias and gymnasiums - will follow the 6-foot threshold because students and staff move around more in those settings, she said.

As for outdoor recess, the district will be forming 3-4-student play cohorts that will rotate between various playground equipment - to enable regular surface sanitation between shifts - according to the Superintendent.

The most important thing is washing their hands before and after everything," she

What about testing and quarantining?

Asymptomatic individuals that have been vaccinated will not be subject to the 10-day quarantine protocol for exposure, according to Macri.

Within the school building environment, a symptomatic exposure will sideline a student for up to 10 days - with an option to test after day 5 and, if negative, return to school by day 8.

For athletic-based exposure in the case of unvaccinated students, however, the quarantine is 10 days, no questions asked.

Per advice from district legal counsel, teachers and other school staff can ask if they've been vaccinated without HIPAA violation, Macri told the Board.

'We can act more quickly than we have in the past as far as quarantining," she said. "We are allowed to ask families voluntarily, that they may [choose whether to] share their vaccine cards."

What about collaborative in-class group-

BOE member Kathryn Russ raised the issue, asking whether the district planned to resume the collaborative small group work put on pause during the worst of the pan-

The work dynamic, she says, is integral to science lab projects, for one thing, she

"It's been detrimental to a lot of our students," Russ said.

Macri says she'd like to have student-toteacher small group instruction – at least.

"We've been killing ourselves to get station to station rotation model because we know kids learn from each other too, but we can't ensure [safety] with the seating charts," Macri said. "They can do the lab and share materials if they're washing their hands. They can't stay three feet apart, but the labs are shorter than 15 minutes. If everyone is willing to share vaccination status, we can worry less about the 3 feet."

What about remote learning for immunocompromised students?

BOE member John Flanders raised the issue, asking whether the SDE has provided guidance in that regard.

Families must provide documentation from a medical provider, which would prompt a 504 plan review, according to

"We would then provide tutoring the

way we normally would, God forbid a kid is sick and couldn't attend school," she said. "We would provide that specialized instruction through the same process." But what about a student with a par-

ent that's immunocompromised? Flanders asked.

Macri said that the district and its legal team from Shipman and Goodwin are awaiting state guidance in that regard.

What happens after the September 30 executive order expiration?

If the mask order is not renewed, districts like Cromwell have options, Macri

The town - school district, Town Manager's office, health department and all - is prepared to begin discussions on easing mitigation measures, if deemed safe to do so, she told the Board.

But at the table, one member expressed some frustration with what she described as a heavy-handed approach by the state.

"Last year we were held accountable as a state. We know as a district we did well. Now that we have vaccines, and our infection rates are low, why should Cromwell be held accountable to the same standards as other towns that are not at the state we are?" Russ asked

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Legislators Call for Special Session on Vehicle Property Crime

Lawmakers are renewing calls for a discussion on motor vehicle property crime – a problem they say is underscored by this month's car theft tragedy in New Britain.

Whether it makes the fall special session agenda – being convened primarily to tackle questions associated with the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) – is yet to be seen, legislators say.

"We've had conversations with state police, police chiefs, and the judiciary chairs," said 28th House District Representative Amy Morrin Bello. "We are concerned about the increases in car thefts, and I'm committed to continuing to work with those stakeholders to try and find solutions that will work."

A bipartisan group of Judiciary Committee members has been working on the issue throughout the summer.

Now, there's renewed impetus to meet a surge in motor vehicle break-ins and thefts with new legislative policies for juvenile repeat offenders in the wake of a June 29 incident, during which two youths led an individual they robbed at a Plainville gas station in a high-speed chase that resulted in a stolen car striking – and killing – a jogger in New Britain.

The 17-year-old perpetrator driving the car had reportedly been arrested 13 times.

"It took the death of a jogger in New Britain to make this happen," said 29th House District Representative Kerry Wood in a recent phone conversation. "All of us can agree we cannot wait for something awful to happen, and awful things have happened, so let's get ahead of this."

That was the rallying cry among municipal leaders heading into the regular session this past spring, with Newington Mayor Beth DelBuono, Rocky Hill Mayor Lisa Marotta, and Wethersfield Mayor Michael Rell joining 5 area towns in drafting a resolution requesting help from Governor Lamont in combating the car thefts that have hit their communities over the recent year.

"I'm happy the legislature has formed this bipartisan committee," Rell said last Friday. "If the experts believe simply putting juveniles in prison won't work, lets have a frank conversation to find out what will – whether it's better management of electronic devices or having our court system process adults involved in crimes where teenagers are used differently."

And while the legislative session yielded new fine and imprisonment penalties for adults that coerce juveniles into committing motor vehicle property crimes, lawmakers like Wood, a member of the moderate Blue Dog Democrats, say they're frustrated that other proposals – such as ankle bracelet GPS monitoring for repeat offenders, new restor-

ative justice programs, a uniform juvenile crime database, expedited judicial hearings, and supervised community service opportunities – were left on the table.

"I wanted to get stuff done two months ago – I feel like we're very reactionary right now," Wood said. "I'm thankful that all of the right people are out the table now."

Wood says the group of Judiciary Committee Republicans and Democrats have been meeting with law enforcement personnel as they set their agenda for the coming special session. As a non-member of that Committee, Wood has been outside those meetings, but like other lawmakers, has been lending insight to the participants.

She says the group has a dozen or so core policy proposals they've agreed to discuss, and that they include the GPS monitoring, as well as early intervention for troubled youth, more funding for after school programs, and expedited arraignment.

"Nobody wants to see these kids thrown in jail, but there need to be consequences and the behavior needs to stop," Wood said.

What constitutes adequate consequence will differ depending on who you ask. Some frustrated residents in Newington – where police reported a 92 percent uptick in motor vehicle thefts in 2020 – have urged lawmakers to take an even harder line, casting blame on post-2012 juvenile justice reforms that hiked the minimum age at which offenders could be treated as adults.

2012 marked a shift in Connecticut juvenile justice policy – toward a more "restorative" approach to dealing with youthful offenders amid calls to keep kids out of the correctional system and avoid the costly pitfalls of long-term recidivism.

What resulted was legislation that:

-Raised the maximum juvenile age from 16 to 18

-Required police officers to obtain a court order to place a juvenile in temporary detention (and later, tightened the conditions for attaining said court order)

-Redirected all runaway and truancy cases from the juvenile court to a Youth Services Bureau

-Instituted a supervised, non-residential probationary program in lieu of DCF treatment of adjudicated individuals

-Reduced the list of Class B felonies that would warrant an automatic transfer from the juvenile to adult criminal court

-Closed the Connecticut Juvenile Training School in 2018

House Representative Gary Turco, who presides over Newington's 27th District, says the reforms have been largely beneficial, noting how overall crime plummeted prior to COVID – even juvenile prosecutors say that the problem segment of repeat youth offenders is marginal compared to those that

have been rehabilitated by the state's focus on alternatives to incarceration.

Since the 2012 policy shift, youth crime – including motor vehicle thefts, save for the past 3 years and particularly 2020 – has been on the downtrend, according to Ken Barone, a data analyst for the Institute for Municipal and Regional Policy.

According to FBI Uniform Crime data from the Office of Policy and Management (OPM) website, motor vehicle thefts across the country went from over 1.2 million in 2005 to around 721,000 in 2019.

In Connecticut, the downtrend over that same period was from 10,609 to 5,694, according to data from OPM.

"The issue of car break-ins and thefts is not unique to Connecticut and has become a national problem since the start of the pandemic," Turco wrote in a letter to this publication. "In fact, the number of these crimes in 2019, before the pandemic, was at a record low. The pandemic and its countless challenges—including increased isolation, tragic loss, unemployment, a disruption in schooling, and financial hardship—to name a few, have contributed to the dramatic increase in many crimes that have negatively impacted our community."

But local leaders have been skeptical of claims attributing the uptick to COVID. Either way, something needs to be done, Rell said.

Last year Wethersfield Police fielded 324 vehicle break-in reports – a historic high. Last year's 75 car theft calls are topped only by the 83 Wethersfield saw back in 2017

"I don't care what the cause is," he said.
"The result is people aren't safe leaving their cars unlocked. Donating clothes in Glaston-bury [where a carjacking took place earlier this month!"

Turco's rallying cry was for lawmakers to take a balanced approach – one that keeps communities safe while steering chronic youth offenders onto a lawful path.

Bello echoed the sentiment.

"I don't want to throw kids in prison and I don't want repeat offenders getting released, only to commit the same crimes," she said. "I'm looking to work with others to find some middle ground."

If there is any issue to be had with the post-2012 reforms, it's the lack of follow-through on some things, Turco says – the state didn't redirect savings from the training school's 2018 closure to youth crime prevention initiatives, and a 2019 diversionary program for second-time offenders was sidelined by COVID.

"While more funding in youth outreach and diversionary programs is necessary to target the root cause of juvenile crime, there are some youths that have become serious repeat offenders, and current community support services have shown to be ineffective in correcting their actions away from further crimes," he wrote. "We should not give up on these youth. We should not lock them in jail and throw away the key. We should provide the additional resources as needed. However, there needs to be additional approaches that hold them properly accountable for their repeated actions."

That puts GPS monitoring, "greater use of residential facilities such as the juvenile detention center in Hartford", expanding police and judicial access to records on past juvenile convictions, and supervised community service hours on the table, he wrote.

"Those who continue to commit serious crimes despite all the rehabilitation efforts need to be held properly accountable, and I strongly support many of the recommendations put forth by law enforcement and the prosecutor's office to do that," Turco wrote.

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Earlier this month, Governor Lamont announced that judges will be given around-the-clock access to juvenile records they need to determine whether to grant an officer's detention request.

"The juvenile that was arrested 13 times and stole a car and killed someone in New Britain," Wood said. "This type of thing would prevent that from happening."



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$Superintendent\ Updates\ on\ Newington\ School\ Reopening\ Plans$

The leading public health expert for five Hartford-area towns says he doesn't think the State Department of Education (SDE) should be pushing for full in-person learning with the surging Delta variant driving up COVID cases.

Central Connecticut Health District (CCHD) Director Charles Brown made the statement at the August 10 Town Council meeting in Newington, after Councilor Mike Camillo asked him, point blank, how he felt about this coming fall with COVID cases climbing among the younger age groups and many school-aged kids still unvaccinated.

"If it were up to me, I would not be bringing kids who are unvaccinated into a school setting where there will be even closer together than they were at the end of last year," Brown said.

Last week Brown said his preference would be the hybrid model districts like Newington used for a good chunk of this past academic year.

While Brown acknowledged the "other considerations" – such as learning loss and social emotional well-being – driving the SDE's reopening guidance to local school districts, he said that his opinion comes exclusively from a public health perspective.

Brown and the CCHD have been working with the Newington school district on reopening plans, which were released on

ing need to protect the health and safety of our students, school staff, and broader community," reads the Newington Public Schools (NPS) plan – available on the NPS website. "While we will never be able to totally eliminate the risk of spreading the COVID-19 virus, our goal is to plan for and implement measures to mitigate COVID-19 transmission in the school setting, while meeting the educational needs of all students."

NPS, in accordance with a Governor's executive order, will require all students and staff to wear masks indoors.

Social distancing continues to be put at premium, with 3-foot minimum separation in classrooms – where seating charts and designated workstations better enable controlled separation and precision contact tracing – and 6 feet elsewhere.

The district also plans to keep students in small group cohorts to minimize transmission risk, while limiting events and gatherings, the plan states.

The plan also includes the provision of sanitizing stations throughout the building, as well as handwashing breaks.

"The safest thing if we have to continue down that path is to ensure everyone is wearing a mask," Brown said. "This is not the time to take that protection away from our children – this is a serious public health event."

Governor Lamont agreed – on August 5 he renewed in-school mask mandates for all students, regardless of vaccination status.

Newington is currently in the State Department of Public Health's (DPH) red threat level, with 17 cases per 100,000.

Both Rocky Hill and Wethersfield – two other CCHD towns – are in red, while Berlin is in vellow.

Public health officials say that 80-90 percent of the positive cases seen in the State's 6-week surge can be attributed to the Delta variant – reported to be twice as contagious as previous strains and responsible for a higher rate of 'breakthrough' COVID cases in vaccinated individuals.

The uptick – from less than 1 percent statewide positivity to over 2.65 percent from July to mid-August – prompted the CDC to reverse course on guidance that vaccinated individuals need not wear masks indoors or outdoors, a pivot that's left many frustrated.

Last Friday, statewide infection rates were above 3 percent.

"We were told we would get the vaccine, herd immunity, and it'd be hunky dory. That's not happening," said Newington Councilor John Donahue. "When do we start treating it like the flu?"

"The vaccines are doing what they're supposed to, which is keep you out of the ICU or the morgue," Brown said. "But you can still transmit the virus to those that are unvaccinated."

And as ICU's become overwhelmed with new COVID cases, the healthcare system is finding that the vast majority of those hospitalized are unvaccinated, Brown noted.

As for herd immunity, that won't happen until the rest of the country catches up to states like Connecticut in their vaccination rollouts, and the global community reaches parity as it pertains to inoculation

cess, Brown said.

Until then, the world will be left wrestling with an ever-adapting coronavirus, he said.

"I was hopeful things would open up and get back to normal, and the bottom fell out," said Town Councilor Tim Manke. "I guess I see this going on and on for years, and I'm hoping I'm wrong."

COVID mitigation measures up to municipalities at this point, Brown says he lobbied aggressively – to no avail – for a uniform mask mandate.

"Not having a mask mandate statewide, to me, is foolish. It leaves us with a patchwork quilt that has gaps in it," he said. "I don't think it's a popular political position right now."

But he's asking local officials to take it up for their communities – last Friday night, Rocky Hill announced that it would be instituting an indoor mask mandate for all public settings, regardless of an individual's vaccination status.

Rocky Hill's masking rule exempts those with certain behavioral challenges and disabilities, as well as those that exercise social distancing indoors.

Op Ed: Policy Debate on Juvenile Crime

A debate is taking place at the Capitol this summer on what policy changes can help reduce the high levels of car break-ins, thefts, and other areas of juvenile crime that have plagued our community. Just like many of you, I am disgusted by the rising number of these crimes throughout Central Connecticut since the beginning of the pandemic.

I want to make it very clear that no one in our community should tolerate any type of crime. The safety of Newington residents is a top priority to me, and my stance on this is unwavering. No one in Newington, nor the rest of our state, should have to experience the frustration and heartbreak of property crime, or worse, violent crime. Reducing car theft, break-ins, and violent crime needs to be a top priority for all levels of government.

This past session, I worked with colleagues in a bipartisan effort to pass legislation to help mitigate the rise in these specific crimes. One new law we passed was aimed at increasing penalties for adults who entice minors to commit these crimes; enticement of minors will now be punishable with fines and prison time. There must be an adult buying the stolen catalytic converters, and we need to investigate and arrest these individuals. Also, over half of these crimes are being committed by individuals over the age of 18 accompanying juveniles. These individuals will now face stricter sentencing.

Another law we passed aimed to improve the judicial process when handling juvenile cases to decrease the time between arrest and the court appearance when sentencing occurs. Other laws will improve diversionary rehabilitation programs and examine the effectiveness of the detainment process when requested by law enforcement. We also included additional services to be provided to high-risk youth.

There are additional bills I supported that did not pass, which would require GPS tracking of repeat offenders, increase accountability of crimes through restorative justice programs, and develop supervised community service opportunities. While these measures did not pass, there is currently a renewed will, due to some very unfortunate serious crimes committed this summer, to hold a special session in the fall to pass further legislation.

At the moment, there are two very different approaches being proposed on how state policy can do a better job in assisting local communities with reducing these crimes. One side is focused on increasing penalties and accountability of the perpetrators of these crimes and the other is focused on providing more community services for rehabilitation, investing in youth outreach, and focusing on prevention through examining the root causes. While these two sides are having difficulty agreeing, I believe, to actually help reduce these crimes permanently, we need a comprehensive approach that includes ideas from both viewpoints.

It is important that we address the issue of crime, and specifically, juvenile crime, to both benefit the safety of our community and to help at-risk youths, many who have been left behind in the state and require rehabilitation services and support. Addressing these crimes through both accountability and investments into prevention and diversionary services to help

children before more serious crimes are committed will benefit all communities and enact long-lasting change towards juvenile crime rates.

To further explain why I think this comprehensive approach should be taken, it is essential to clarify some misinformation being spread in the community. First, the issue of car break-ins and thefts is not unique to Connecticut and has become a national problem since the start of the pandemic. In fact, the number of these crimes in 2019, before the pandemic, was at a record low. The pandemic and its countless challenges—including increased isolation, tragic loss, unemployment, a disruption in schooling, and financial hardship—to name a few, have contributed to the dramatic increase in many crimes that have negatively impacted our community.

So, let's not blame policies that were enacted before the pandemic when crimes rates were decreasing, such as the juvenile justice policy passed in 2011 known as 'Raise Your Age'. This policy tries juveniles of non-violent crimes in juvenile court rather than adult court. Mass incarceration of youth has proven time and time again not to have an effect on lowering these types of crimes. Furthermore, we have seen that jail sentences result in increased recidivism rates and hardened criminals.

The state's transition towards providing rehabilitative services and community diversionary programs instead of prison for juveniles was born out of best practices through data, policy analysis, and advisement from criminal justice and law enforcement experts. However, the state has not properly put the funding and resources behind these policies to ensure their success. For example, when the state closed the Connecticut Juvenile Training School in early 2018, a high-security juvenile jail in Middletown, it did not

properly shift this funding directly into the community services. These services were expected to provide accountability and rehabilitation as an alternative to jail sentencing. As a result, the state was not properly set up for a rise in juvenile crime due to a pandemic and has failed these children and our communities, making a strong case for an immediate investment into prevention and rehabilitation services.

In 2019, the state created a new diversionary program within the court system for first or second-time offenders of property crimes like car thefts and break-ins. The program is designed to identify the specific rehabilitative and social services necessary to help get juveniles back on track. However, due to COVID-19, the program's implementation was delayed, only finally starting in December of 2020. The program is already seeing success and lowering recidivism rates, but more funding, personnel, and program support are needed to ensure its ongoing success.

While more funding in youth outreach and diversionary programs is necessary to target the root cause of juvenile crime, there are some youths that have become serious repeat offenders, and current community support services have shown to be ineffective in correcting their actions away from further crimes.

We should not give up on these youth. We should not lock them in jail and throw away the key. We should provide the additional resources as needed. However, there needs to be additional approaches that hold them properly accountable for their repeated actions. This may need to include greater use of residential facilities such as the juvenile detention center in Hartford, GPS monitoring, expedited court proceedings, expanded access of data on past convictions for law enforcement and judges to provide more appropriate sentencing, and supervised community service hours. Those who continue to commit serious crimes despite all the rehabilitation efforts need to be held properly accountable, and I strongly support many of the recommendations put forth by law enforcement and the prosecutor's office to do that.

While the debate continues, I am calling on both Democrats and Republicans, municipal and state leaders, law enforcement, and juvenile justice advocates to join together and find common ground compromises that help prevent these crimes from happening further, support our youth through proper funding of services and proper accountability for crimes, and make all of our communities safer from crime. While some prefer to just point fingers and shift blame on to others, I am committed to fostering and helping lead the efforts needed until these issues no longer plague us.



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Legislators Call for Special Session on Vehicle Property Crime

Lawmakers are renewing calls for a discussion on motor vehicle property crime – a problem they say is underscored by this month's car theft tragedy in New Britain.

Whether it makes the fall special session agenda - being convened primarily to tackle questions associated with the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) - is yet to be seen,

"We've had conversations with state police, police chiefs, and the judiciary chairs," said 28th House District Representative Amy Morrin Bello. "We are concerned about the increases in car thefts, and I'm committed to continuing to work with those stakeholders to try and find solutions that will work.'

A bipartisan group of Judiciary Committee members has been working on the issue throughout the summer.

Now, there's renewed impetus to meet a surge in motor vehicle break-ins and thefts with new legislative policies for juvenile repeat offenders in the wake of a June 29 incident, during which two youths led an individual they robbed at a Plainville gas station in a high-speed chase that resulted in a stolen car striking – and killing – a jogger in New Britain.

The 17-year-old perpetrator driving the car had reportedly been arrested 13 times.

"It took the death of a jogger in New Britain to make this happen," said 29th House District Representative Kerry Wood in a recent phone conversation. "All of us can agree we cannot wait for something awful to happen, and awful things have happened, so let's get ahead of this.'

That was the rallying cry among municipal leaders heading into the regular session this past spring, with Newington Mayor Beth DelBuono, Rocky Hill Mayor Lisa Marotta, and Wethersfield Mayor Michael Rell joining 5 area towns in drafting a resolution requesting help from Governor Lamont in combating the car thefts that have hit their communities over the recent year.

"I'm happy the legislature has formed this bipartisan committee," Rell said last Friday. "If the experts believe simply putting juveniles in prison won't work, lets have a frank conversation to find out what will - whether it's better management of electronic devices or having our court system process adults involved in crimes where teenagers are used

And while the legislative session yielded new fine and imprisonment penalties for adults that coerce juveniles into committing motor vehicle property crimes, lawmakers like Wood, a member of the moderate Blue Dog Democrats, say they're frustrated that other proposals – such as ankle bracelet GPS monitoring for repeat offenders, new restorative justice programs, a uniform juvenile crime database, expedited judicial hearings, and supervised community service opportunities – were left on the table.

'I wanted to get stuff done two months ago – I feel like we're very reactionary right now," Wood said. "I'm thankful that all of the right people are out the table now."

Wood says the group of Judiciary Committee Republicans and Democrats have been meeting with law enforcement personnel as they set their agenda for the coming special session. As a non-member of that Committee, Wood has

been outside those meetings, but like other lawmakers, has been lending insight to the participants.

She says the group has a dozen or so core policy proposals they've agreed to discuss, and that they include the GPS monitoring, as well as early intervention for troubled youth, more funding for after school programs, and expedited ar-

"Nobody wants to see these kids thrown in jail, but there need to be consequences and the behavior needs to stop," Wood said.

What constitutes adequate consequence will differ depending on who you ask. Some frustrated residents in Newington - where police reported a 92 percent uptick in motor vehicle thefts in 2020 - have urged lawmakers to take an even harder line, casting blame on post-2012 juvenile justice reforms that hiked the minimum age at which offenders could be treated as adults.

2012 marked a shift in Connecticut juvenile justice policy - toward a more "restorative" approach to dealing with youthful offenders amid calls to keep kids out of the correctional system and avoid the costly pitfalls of long-term

What resulted was legislation that:

Raised the maximum juvenile age from 16 to 18

-Required police officers to obtain a court order to place a juvenile in temporary detention (and later, tightened the conditions for attaining said court order)

-Redirected all runaway and truancy cases from the juvenile court to a Youth Services Bureau

-Instituted a supervised, non-residential probationary program in lieu of DCF treatment of adjudicated individuals

-Reduced the list of Class B felonies that would warrant an automatic transfer from the juvenile to adult criminal

-Closed the Connecticut Juvenile Training School in

House Representative Gary Turco, who presides over Newington's 27th District, says the reforms have been largely beneficial, noting how overall crime plummeted prior to COVID – even juvenile prosecutors say that the problem segment of repeat youth offenders is marginal compared to those that have been rehabilitated by the state's focus on alternatives to incarceration.

Since the 2012 policy shift, youth crime – including motor vehicle thefts, save for the past 3 years and particularly 2020 - has been on the downtrend, according to Ken Barone, a data analyst for the Institute for Municipal and Re-

According to FBI Uniform Crime data from the Office of Policy and Management (OPM) website, motor vehicle thefts across the country went from over 1.2 million in 2005 to around 721,000 in 2019.

In Connecticut, the downtrend over that same period was from 10,609 to 5,694, according to data from OPM.

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Police Chief Search Firm Narrows Down Candidates

The executive search firm hired to help Wethersfield find its next police chief has complied a shortlist of top candidates, and town residents will have the chance to meet the finalists this fall, said Mayor Michael Rell.

The town hired Strategic Government Resources (SGR), a Texas-based executive talent recruiter that specializes in the municipal side – including public safety – this

SGR held a listening session with members of the public back in May to hear what residents want in their next chief. That went into a job description disseminated to SGR's national network of candidates.

Now, SGR has 15 resumes - selected from the wider pool of respondents – to sift through as they work their way down to a final five, according to Rell.

"We will get input from the public one way or another, similar to how we did it with the Town Manager position,"

When the town hired Town Manager Gary Evans, he was one of four finalists that took part in a meet and greet with residents at the Keeney Cultural Center - just one leg of a process that included interviews with town department heads and staff.

And while the idea here will be similar, it probably won't be the same venue, the Mayor says.

"A week ago I was planning to have it at the community center, but now with the Delta variant surging, we may have to do that through Zoom," Rell said.

He's shooting for some time in mid-September.

"I think the idea was to have a new chief hired and in place by October if not sooner," Rell said.

The town has been looking for a replacement for former Police Chief James Cetran since he announced his retirement in January.

The process continued throughout a dispute between Cetran and Evans over his August 31 retirement date -

which Cetran reneged on in a February 8 letter, prompting a Town Council hearing and his subsequent termination.

That's currently the subject of an appeal, as Cetran claims that he walked back his retirement - agreed to, as a condition for his January 18 return from administrative leave - because he felt the Evans had violated the terms of their deal by "micromanaging" disciplinary matters within

SGS, meanwhile, will running its finalist recommendations by Evans and a Council search committee consisting of Councilors Pat Pentalow, Ryan Biggs, and Dan O'Connor after which the frontrunners will be introduced to the pub-

At the May 18 listening session, town resident participants said that they wanted the new chief to be an accessible, visible presence throughout the community.

They also recommended leaning toward internal candidates that would have a strong familiarity with the town.



Special Transportation

The office of the Director of Special Education and Pupil Services will notify parents of the arrangements for students in special education programs.

Kindergarten Routes

All Kindergarten students must be met at the bus stop by a parent or authorized adult.

Safety and Bus Behavior

Students transported, in the interest of safety, must observe rules of good behavior, and be considerate of others. They must be seated immediately and remain seated while the vehicle is in motion. Students misbehaving and failing to abide by regulations may be denied the privilege of riding on school buses either temporarily or permanently.

Bus Stops

The maximum walking distances to a prescribed point of embarkation are the following: (1) kindergarten, one mile; (2) elementary schools, one mile; (3) middle school, one and one-half mile; (4) high school, two miles. It is the Board of Education's firm belief that parents/guardians are responsible for insuring proper supervision of their children as they walk to and from bus stops and while waiting for the bus at such stops.

Such supervision extends to daycare operators and other non-parental guardians providing oversight to children. This belief also includes, but is not limited to, cases where supervision may be necessary to gain access to a sidewalk located on the opposite side of the street as a child walks to a bus stop. How Pet Owners Can Prepare for Disasters in Advance

The need to prepare for natural disasters is never apparent than right after especially storm touches down. But disaster preparation should be a proactive endeavor, as taking action before a storm can make confronting the storm that much



Pet owners must give extra thought to disaster preparedness to ensure their pets can make it through harsh storms unscathed. Natural disasters like storms and fires can put pets in jeopardy, so it's vital that pet owners take the steps necessary to protect their furry friends before such disasters strike.

- Place a rescue alert sticker on your front door or window. Rescue alert stickers alert first responders to the presence of pets in a home. The ASPCA recommends placing the sticker on the front door or window (visit aspca.org to receive a free sticker). Include the types and numbers of pets in the home as well as the name and phone number of your veterinarian.
- · Learn about local safe havens. If pet owners must evacuate in the case of a coming storm, their pets must evacuate as well. Some animal shelters provide emergency shelter for pets and/or can arrange for pets to be fostered until their owners can safely return home. It's

vital to conduct this research in advance, as the ASPCA notes that not all shelters can accommodate pets during storms or other emergencies. Knowing which ones do can ensure pets have a safe place to go should disaster

- Stock up on emergency supplies. The ASPCA recommends pet owners plan as if they won't be allowed to return home for several weeks, even if they suspect their time away will be much shorter. Speak with your vet about what to include in a pet first-aid kit, and be sure to bring at least several days' worth of canned (pop-top) or dry food. Disposable litter trays, liquid dish soap and disinfectant and an extra collar or harness and extra leash are some additional emergency supplies to pack. A full list of recommended emergency supplies can be found at aspca.org
- Make sure pets wear collars and tags at all times. Disaster can strike at any time, so it's vital that pets wear their identification tags and collars at all times. The ASPCA urges pet owners to include pets' names and any urgent medical needs on the tags. A telephone number where owners can be reached at all hours of the day should be included on tags as well.
- Take location into account. The ASPCA advises pet owners who live in regions prone to certain disasters to find rooms in their homes which can serve as safe havens during storms. Many storms do not require evacuations, but that does not mean pets won't be frightened. Safe rooms should be clear of windows and

be easily accessible and easy to clean. Disaster preparedness includes strategies to keep pets safe in the wake of storms or other potentially hazardous situations.

The Cromwell Public Schools announced today its policy for determining eligibility of children who may receive free or reduced-price meals served under the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and School Breakfast Program (SBP), Seamless Summer Option (SSO) of the NSLP, or free milk served under the Special Milk Program (SMP).

Local school officials have adopted the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Income Eligibility Guidelines (IEGs) for family size and income criteria for determining eligibility. The following income guidelines will be used in Connecticut from July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2022, for determining eligibility of participants for free and reduced-price meals and free milk in the Child Nutrition Programs.

The income calculations (left) are based on the following formulas:

- · monthly income is calculated by dividing the annual income
- twice monthly income is computed by dividing annual income
- income received every two weeks is calculated by dividing annual income by 26; and
- weekly income is computed by dividing annual income by 52.

All numbers are rounded upward to the next whole dollar.

For school year 2021-22, the Cromwell Public Schools has opted to participate in the Seamless Summer Option of the NSLP. Therefore, all student meals offered will be free of charge for this school year. However, in order to determine if students are eligible for other benefits such as Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) (as applicable), households are encouraged to complete and submit a free and reduced-

Students residing in households with income at or below the levels shown in the chart above are eligible for free or reduced-price meals or free milk. Application forms will be sent home along with a letter to parents. To apply for free or reduced-price meals or free milk, households should fill out the application and

return it to the school. Additional copies are available in each school office and on the district website. Only one application is required per household and an application for free or

breakfast, milk, and P-EBT programs. Additionally, all school-aged students in income-eligible households can receive school meal benefits regardless of a student's immigration status, and the district/school does not release information for immigration-related purposes in the usual course of operating the CNPs. Note that the district may share your eligibility information with education, health, social service, and nutrition programs to help them evaluate, fund, or determine benefits for their programs, auditors for program reviews, and law enforcement officials to help them look into violations of program rules. This information may also be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. For up to 30 operating days into the new school year, eligibility from the previous year will continue within the same local educational agency (LEA). When the carry-over period

The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purposes of determining eligibility and for administration and enforcement of the lunch,

ends, unless the household is notified that the students are directly certified or the household submits an application that is approved, the students must pay full price for SBP and NSLP school meals during SY 2021-22 unless the school or district is implementing the SSO for SY 2021-22 which allows meals to be served free of charge to all students. Households will not be sent a reminder or a notice of expired eligibility in those districts participating in the National School Lunch or Breakfast Programs No application is required if the district directly certifies a student based on a household member receiving assistance from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or the Temporary Family Assistance (TFA) program. All students in these households are eligible for free meal benefits. Households receiving assistance under the SNAP/TFA programs will be notified of their eligibility and students residing in the household will be provided free benefits unless the household notifies the determining official that it

chooses to decline benefits. If any students were not listed on the eligibility notice, the household should contact the district or school to have free meal benefits extended to those students. Households receiving SNAP or TFA benefits for their children should only submit an application if they are not notified of their eligibility by August 30, 2021. Some students may be directly certified for free or reduced-price meals based on Medicaid (HUSKY A). No application is required if the district directly certifies a student based on Medicaid (HUSKY A). All students in these households are eligible for free or reduced-priced meal benefits. Households receiving assistance under Medicaid (HUSKY A) will be notified of their eligibility and their children will be provided free or reduced-price benefits accordingly, unless the household notifies the determining official that it chooses to

decline benefits. If any students were not listed on the eligibility notice, the household should contact the district or school to have free or reduced-price meal benefits extended If a student is not directly certified, the household should complete a free and reduced-price meal application form. The application for the SNAP or TFA households require the SNAP

Students in households participating in the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Please send in an application or contact the determining official for more information.

or TFA case number and the households may be asked to provide proof of the SNAP or TFA case number. The signature of an adult household member is also required.

When known to the district/school, households will be notified of any student's eligibility for free meals if the individual student is Other Source Categorically Eligible because the student is categorized as either: Homeless; runaway as defined by law and determined by the district's or school's homeless liaison; or enrolled in an eligible Head Start or prekindergarten class as defined by law. Households with students who are categorically eligible under Other Source Categorically Eligible Programs should complete an application and check-off the relevant box. Questions should be directed to the determining official. For any student not listed on the eligibility notice, the households should contact the school or determining official about any student also eligible under one of these programs or should submit an income application for the other students.

Households notified of their children's eligibility must contact the determining official or school if it chooses to decline the free meal benefits. If households/students are not notified by the district/school of their free meal benefits and they receive benefits under qualifying public assistance programs or under Other Source Categorically Eligible Programs, the parent/guardian should contact the determining official or their school.

Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are categorically eligible for free meals. A foster parent does not have to complete a free/reduced meal application if they can submit a copy of the legal document or legal court order showing that the student is a foster child. Additionally, a foster child may be included as a member of the foster family if the foster family chooses to also apply for benefits. If the foster family is not eligible for free or reduced-price meal benefits, it does not prevent a foster child from receiving free school meals. Note however, that a foster child's eligibility for free school meals does not automatically extend to all students in the household.

Application forms for all other households require a statement of total household income, household size and names of all household members. The last four digits of the social security number of an adult household member must be included or a statement that the household member does not have one. The adult household member must also sign the application certifying that the information provided is correct.

Under the provisions of the policy for determining eligibility for free and reduced-price meals, the Food & Nutrition Coordinator (860)632-4840 will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent/guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the determining official, they may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If they wish to make a formal appeal, a request either orally or in writing, may be made to Ann Burke, Director of Financial Services 9 Mann Memorial Drive Cromwell, CT 06416 (860) 632-4837 for a hearing to appeal the decision.

The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure. Each school and the central office of the school district has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by an interested

If a household member becomes unemployed or if household size changes at any time, the household should contact the school to file a new application. Such changes may make the students of the household eligible for reduced-price meals, free meals, or free milk, if the household income falls at or below the levels shown in the Income Guidelines.

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Clark: The Voice of the Wethersfield Eagles

If you've been to a Wethersfield High School athletic event over the past three years you've heard the distinctive voice of Jimmie Clark.

Clark has been the public address/play-by-play announcer at nearly every Eagles home game since 2018.

The polished product you hear now has been refined from his early days announcing a 'Hoops for Heart' event in middle school.

His first official announcing gig came in 2017 as a freshman at WHS, "The first game I did was soccer at Cottone, and I was a nervous wreck."

Upon getting home from the game, his mom told him she got a call from Athletic Director Mike Maltese, "I thought 'oh no, what did I do now?' but he told her that I was a rockstar and that they are keeping me for the rest of the year and in the future."

Since that day, Clark has been the official voice of the Eagles.

Clark's origin story is similar to that of an athlete. He fell in love with announcing at an early age, listening to Joe Castiglione and Dave O'Brien announce Boston Red Sox games. It's then when he discovered his talent and began sharing it with the world.

"Growing up I was diagnosed with Asperger's and one of the things I would do religiously was verbatim do the games I heard on the radio," said Clark, who has a knack for recalling random facts and information from yesteryear, "My mom first noticed because my kindergarten teacher called and said I had to talk to your son today because he was doing a game verbatim today in class and the only

reason I noticed this is because I stayed up to watch the same game last night on NESN."

Clark's play-by-play days date back to elementary school when would record himself calling his classmates playing soccer during recess at Charles Wight Elementary, "The teacher would read a story after recess and I would be sitting outside of class listening to the recording going over the games, skipping ahead to the highlights."

All the practice has paid off for Clark, who has developed his passion and is now voicing some of the biggest games in the state. His idol is legendary ice hockey playby-play announcer Mike "Doc" Emrick, who Clark would listen to during the Staley Cup finals.

He channeled his inner-Emrick when the WHS ice hockey team avenged a tournament loss to Branford, erasing a two-goal deficit to win an overtime thriller in February 2020.

"We really packed the Newington arena. I remember getting chirped at by one of the Branford players as one of their big stars came over to the penalty box," recalled Clark, who called this his favorite moment thus far in the booth, "We went into overtime, and I remember just yelling at that point. There was no calm commentary at that point. Aaron Cholewa

got the puck on the opposite side of the rink, brings in up through the neutral zone, gets passed everybody and he forehand-backhands it on the goalie and the goalie dove for it and fell out of the crease and Cholewa shovel shots it, as Emrick would say, to top shelf of the net. It was deafening in the Newington Arena."

Clark was also on the call during ice hockey's epic five-overtime game against Newington in last season's conference tourney.

Clark worked a double header that day---also calling the girls ice hockey game---and was exhausted by the time the marathon game ended in the early hours on the next day.

Wethersfield came out on the losing end but Clark remembered a defining moment as he went to go say goodbye to the Eagles in the locker room, "As the Newington kids were walking by one of them saw me and came over, took his glove off, shook my hand, and said 'you've got a fantastic voice, we loved hearing you on the bench, and you're going somewhere. That meant so much even though I was incredibly sad that point."

Over the years, Clark has received the occasional criticism from opposing parents or coaches, but the feedback has been overwhelmingly positive.

His smooth delivery and ability to make things up on the fly are universally liked by Wethersfield's athletes, coaches, and fans. He's voiced nearly every sport, sometimes having to learn the rules of the sport as he calls the games, and his commentary has created opportunities outside of the school.

This summer he served as a production intern and got some play-by-play practice with the

Norwich Sea Unicorns. He's has also announced Connecticut Twilight baseball games, Wethersfield Dodger games, Tri-State League baseball, and other various sporting events over the years.

This winter he will expand to college sports, calling games for the Blue Devils ice hockey at Central Connecticut State University.

When he's not in the booth, he's updating the WHS sports happenings for the Blue Eagles News, which airs on YouTube.

He credits his parents for allowing him to follow his dream, "I've been lucky to have parents that are supportive. They'll take me to Dodd Stadium a couple of nights a week or take me to Municipal Stadium in Waterbury for a few nights, anywhere I need to go."

Clark's father is a secondgeneration firefighter. His older brother, Matt Clark, is currently in fire school in Fairfax Country, Virginia and he has a twin sister, Erin Clark, is also entering her senior year at WHS.

Despite having deep roots in Wethersfield, Clark is looking into a variety of colleges across the country with communication and journalism degrees, as he hopes to turn his passion into a career.

But before that, he's got one more season left on the mics at WHS

"I can't explain how awesome it's going to be for that first football game," Clark said of the Eagles home opener against Berlin on Sept 17, "It will be so good to be up in the press box and welcoming everybody back in the stadium, hearing the roar of the crowd."

He was named a captain prior to his senior season this spring and was all set to make a big splash but injuries prevented him from reaching his full potential.

"I missed out on all the first practices and the first game and that was the start of an unfortunate tale. I came back and was playing catch-up from the jump. I ended up creating a tear in my labrum of my throwing arm. I was devastated and I was out for the season from throwing," added Wenzel, who gutted out his senior season, "I would have never thought the last time I threw a high school pitch would be my all-conference season as an underdeveloped sophomore. I found myself in and out of the lineup as a DH for the rest of the year with nagging injuries including hamstring and injury management of my shoulder."

Despite the setbacks, Wenzel shared some good times with unforgettable teammates, "A lot of them have gone on to play college ball and succeed. It's amazing and I love those guys I've played with, most of them since I was less than 10 years old, from the little league days to the Generals AAU team to MHS baseball."

He now has a renewed since of energy and his ready for the next challenge, "I'm getting super healthy and eyeing an incredible comeback story from one of the scariest surgeries a pitcher can get."

Wenzel credited his Middletown coaches and teammates, along with his AAU teammates and coaches for helping him be the player he is today, "A huge shout out to my Generals team and coaches Paul Radziewicz, Rick Murray, Pat Lenahan, Pat Wantanabe, and Eddie Valariano, and one of my biggest influences Bill Tobin, along with a super important piece to my puzzle, coach Trevor Brown. Couldn't have down it without him, and a thank you to the MHS staff and family for what they did

for me as well."

Besides baseball, Wenzel also played basketball as a freshman, learning from some incredible MHS athletes, "Being around one of the best athletes I know DeAaron Lawrence and others like Brennan Maxfield, they taught me a lot about wanting to be the best in everything I do, and that hard work truly does pay off."

He was also part of National Honor Society and added that he took pride in being a presence in the classroom, crediting his brother Tyler Wenzel and his parents for his work ethic.

He also participated in band for the first two years of high school, playing the clarinet and was 2nd chair his sophomore year.

Now fully health following shoulder surgery, he'll join a Blue Devils team at CCSU that is coming off a 28-15 season, which included a Northeast Conference championship and an appearance in the NCAA tournament.

"I chose CCSU because they are an incredible program with a school really close to home. I've always wanted to land here, and I made my dream become a reality of being a Division 1 pitcher but ultimately that's just the tip of the iceberg of where I hope to be one day," stated Wenzel, "I'm excited to show my stuff on a bigger level. Ready to show what Connecticut




Logan Wenzel, a 2021 graduate of Middletown High School, will pitch for CCSU.

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
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
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
